...to our 57th season, and an exciting line-up of art and craft classes, exhibitions, events, a fun line-up of Kids Camps, our third annual 1000 Islands Art \& Craft \& Antique Festival, and a return of our Elves' Fair.

Our very special headliner exhibition, Color Culture: Our History and Heritage Through Fiber, is a collaboration between TIAC and the Fiber Artists Miami Association (FAMA) and is supported by the Coby Foundation, Ltd. The transformative exhibition brings together two distinctive organizations, both with the mission of educating and advancing the fiber arts.

We are pleased to introduce many new instructors this year offering new and often requested classes such as chair caning, candle making, and fused glass.

First up on the exhibition schedule is Cross Country Weavers: Celebrating 60 Years of Weaving, which features weavings and drafts by this select group of national weavers, as well as pieces woven by members of our own Wednesday Weavers. Sonja Wahl, Curator Emerita: A Look Back, which honors the career and history of TIAC's first curator, will follow.

The Art of Millinery: Hats by Sally Caswell is next. Milliner Caswell will come to TIAC this spring with her stunning hats and headpieces. Among her many accolades, Caswell has created hats for Broadway, Disney, operas, ballets, and TV, and helped install headpieces for the exhibits at the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

Opposite "Hats" in the Johnson Gallery will be Among the Thousand Islands: The Work of Frank Taylor in the Trimble Gallery. Taylor was an artist and author during the late 19th century and while on assignment illustrating and describing the Thousand Islands for Harper's Weekly, Taylor found his own place and peace here on the River.

The long-time annual favorite Along the River's Edge, a juried exhibition of artists working in all mediums, opens in July for a full month.

The 28th Weaving History Conference will be held virtually in October and include a notable roster of academic presentations. And, Finders Keepers, our popular resale shop offering eclectic and gently used vintage goods and antiques, will return for its third year.

Please be sure to check out the complete calendar on the back cover of this catalog.
As we put the pandemic behind us, I want to thank you, our steadfast members, for your loyal support. The commitment shown TIAC over the past three challenging COVID years was inspiring and demonstrated just how important a vibrant arts scene is in our cherished River communities.

In this class you'll learn to weave a mini colorful basket that can be used in a variety of ways. You'll start with a base with pre-glued spokes. Then this cute little basket is triple-twined with three colors of cotton cord and soft suede in a stacking pattern. The rim is accented with braided cotton cord and lashed with cotton cord. All materials are included in the tuition.

## FISHING CREEL <br> WITH LEATHER

( $101 / 2{ }^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{L} \times 8^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{W} \times \mathrm{7}^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{H}$ approx.)

This newly-designed creel is woven with reed in a continuous weave. There is significant attention to shaping as it is made to conform to be worn on one's hip. Since this part can be a bit of a challenge, Linda will guide you through the entire process. After the rim is double lashed with artificial sinew, you'll work with sharp leather cutting tools to cut a leather lid to fit your woven creel. The buckle strap will then be ready to attach and you'll be ready to go fishing! All materials are included in tuition.

For students who completed Sue's "Drawing Birds in Graphite Pencil" class (not a prerequisite): You can start by tracing the major outlines of a bird so you're able to spend more time on the details of feathers and pencil technique in this class.

## INTRODUCTION TO FUSED GLASS

Kathy Morris
Glass fusing is a process of taking compatible glass, stacking it to make a pattern or design and then firing it in a kiln until the glass melts together. In this class you'll be introduced to the many fundamental concepts of creating glass objects in the kiln, including how to cut glass, construction methods, and firing work in the kiln. After a brief overview you'll make an $8^{\prime \prime} \times 8^{\prime \prime}$ fused panel using a wide assortment of supplied glass. Panels will be fired after the workshop and available for pick-up a few days later. Includes all materials and firing.

## MOSAICS \& GLASS



## MOSAIC GLASS ART Susan Berry

Learn the ancient technique of mosaic art using an array of beautiful, multicolored stained glass. You'll start by choosing from a variety of river and nature-themed patterns designed by the instructor, which are then traced onto an $8^{\prime \prime} x 8^{\prime \prime}$ indoor/outdoor tile as the pallet for your creation. You'll then learn glass cutting skills, mosaic glass laying techniques and grouting as you create your finished piece. Once you've learned how to do mosaic art, you'll want to mosaic everything!
