NEW MUSEUM & ARTS CENTER

Our new museum and arts center being built at 321 James Street is progressing nicely. After nearly 18 months of design development in collaboration with Taylored Architecture, PLLC, of Clayton, and Black Horse Construction Group of Watertown, we broke ground in August — a thrilling site to behold after years of wishing/trying/ hoping for this project to come to fruition!

The new 13,000+ square foot structure will be three stories (plus lower level) and include two large galleries, one of which will have a permanent rotating textile exhibition displayed; three classrooms, one exclusively for our children's programming; a gift shop, library, weaving studio, archives, conference/meeting room, administrative space, plus an elevator!

Demolition, starting with asbestos removal followed by site excavation was completed in the late fall, and, as of this writing (January), cement was being poured in preparation for the elevator pit and foundation. We anticipate completion next winter and a grand opening in the late spring/early summer 2026.

We are very excited to announce that we were recently gifted the property to the north (former home of River Magic, the gift shop located at 313 James Street). It will be the temporary home of Finders Keepers with eventual demolition planned to install a "vest-pocket park" — a small space accessible to the general public. Plans to create a sculpture garden are underway. This parcel will become permanent "green space" — a welcome addition to the Village landscape, and an attractive enhancement to our new adjacent facility.

Exhibition planning is proceeding for next year's grand opening, and will no doubt allow for greater exhibits. Having plentiful, quality space to finally showcase our treasured textile collection and make it more available to the public has been a driving force behind this new museum initiative. The library and archives will also be expanded and made more accessible for the many scholars and weavers who consider our facilities a valuable resource for research.

Having new classroom space wholly dedicated to our popular children's programming will allow for more classes and diversity in what we offer, not to mention eliminate the rental expenses we have incurred over the years because of space limitations.

The new gift shop will give local and regional artists and artisans a lovely space to display and sell their wares, and provide an additional revenue stream that's been challenging in our John Street location.

We look forward to welcoming you to our new arts center and museum next year, and greatly appreciate all of the support we have received from the community, our patrons, and membership.

SEASONAL ESSENCE BASKET (6 ¼" D x 2 ¾" H to top of rim, 3 ¾" w/ handles approx.) Linda Scherz

This is a fun basket to make. You'll start with spokes pre-glued in the base, which allows you to start weaving right away on class day. The design is triple twined with three colors of cotton cord, sueded leather wrapped handles, and finished with a simple rim and braided cotton cord rim filler accent. Linda will teach and guide you through all of her techniques for weaving and shaping.

All materials and tools to make the basket will be provided. Please wear comfortable clothing and bring lunch and a drink.

ARROW MARKET BASKET (8"L x 12"W x 12"H approx.) Linda Scherz

This is a wonderful and versatile basket that can serve so many purposes — the garden, farmers market, grocery store, picnic, or whenever you need a sturdy basket to carry your things. You'll weave with various sizes of natural and dyed reed, and Linda will have a selection of colors available to personalize the arrow accent on your basket.

All materials are provided. Please wear comfortable clothes and bring lunch and a drink. Baskets will not be stained during class.

CANE WEBBING REPAIR Lauren Evans

Restore your damaged caned chair! Lauren will guide you through the process of installing new sheet cane in this one-day class. Before class, please remove all traces of the old spline and caning with a chisel, mat knife, or a thin flat screwdriver. Please bring a new piece of sheet cane (2" larger than your caning area), replacement spline, a wood chisel and wood glue, and a mallet to class with you. Caning supplies can be purchased at HHPerkins.com, PeerlessRatan.com, or Amazon.com.

CUSTOM JUNIOR ADIRONDACK PACK BASKET (6"L x 8"W x 10 ½"H approx.) Linda Scherz

In this class you'll learn to weave a mini colorful basket that can be used in a variety of ways. You'll start with a base with pre-glued spokes. Then this cute little basket is triple twined with three colors cotton cord and soft suede in a stacking pattern. The rim is accented with braided cotton cord and lashed with cotton cord.

All materials are included in the tuition. Please bring lunch and a drink.

DRAWING OWLS Sue deLearie Adair

In this two-morning workshop we will review basic drawing techniques and then concentrate on how to create realistic drawings of owls using graphite pencils. Sue will supply all materials including photographic references. You will be able to choose from several owls and leave the class with a completed drawing and information on bird forms and feathers. Sue will also email students information about supplies and bird anatomy prior to the class.

The rim is a simple braided rim and you'll complete it with a cotton cord necklace. All materials are provided. Please wear comfortable clothing and bring a lunch and drink.

Discover how professionalgrade dye powders work over ice, where slow melting creates uncontrolled color splits and one-of-a-kind patterns. Perfect for beginners and seasoned artists, this two-day workshop offers the freedom to experiment with unique colorways while embracing the beauty of the unexpected. T-shirts are provided for the class. Please click on your size when registering. It is important to wear a mask while doing the ice dyeing process, as you'll be using a powder form of the dye. A mask will be provided to you or bring your own.

BRAIDED WOOL STOOL COVER (OR CAT NAPPER) Helen Condon

In this two-day class, you'll learn how to braid wool material into a comfortable stool cover — or if you choose, you can continue to braid it upward to create a cozy bed for your kitty. Wool kits will be provided and Helen will contact you before class to discuss color choices for your project. With Helen's guidance and step-bystep approach, you'll leave class with a completed project and all the skills and techniques to continue creating at home!

NEEDLEPOINT DESIGN Christina Loew

The goal of this class for needlepoint enthusiasts is to learn to recognize patterns or pictures that will or will not translate well into needlepoint and why. While time won't allow for getting into the actual needlepoint work, you'll be able to set up your pattern and take home at least one prepared canvas. Please bring a range of photos or design ideas suitable for a project approximately 8 inches square.

INTRODUCTION TO BOBBIN LACE Beth Parkes

Bobbin lace is a handmade lacemaking technique that involves twisting and braiding threads wound onto bobbins to create a pattern. This class is designed to introduce students to the delight of making bobbin lace (also known as pillow lace). Students will learn the basic stitches of Torchon bobbin lace: cloth, half, and whole stitch. Projects to choose from are a simple bookmark, a bracelet, or a lace flower. Students with previous experience are also welcome to join the class to renew their skills!

You'll have the opportunity to design your own project, investigate different weave structures, and discover some of the endless possibilities of weaving on a 4-harness loom. The instructor will contact all students prior to class to discuss yarn and pattern options. Shoes must be removed while treadling on the floor looms so please plan accordingly. Bring lunch and a drink.
